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## The Acts of the Apostles "To the end of the earth" Acts 1:8



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Acts 1:5, " 'for John truly baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.' "

Ezek. 11:19, "Then I will give them one heart, and I will put a new Spirit within them, and take the stony heart out of their flesh, and give them a heart of flesh,"

Ezek. 36:26, "I will give you a new heart and put a new Spirit within you; I will take the heart of stone out of your flesh and give you a heart of flesh.

Ezek. 36:27, "I will put My Spirit within you and cause you to walk in My statutes, and you will keep My judgments and do *them*."

Ezek. 37:14, "'I will put My Spirit in you, and you shall live, and I will place you in your own land. Then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken *it* and performed *it,*' says the LORD."

Acts 1:4, "And being assembled together with them, He commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father, 'which,' He said, 'you have heard from Me;

Acts 1:5, "for

John [agent] baptized [active voice]

The baptism by means of the Holy Spirit (HS)

is the work of Christ whereby

at the moment of faith alone in Christ alone

Christ uses the HS (in the act of regeneration)

to identify the believer with the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ. So that he is a new creature in Christ.

1 Cor. 12:13, "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free, and we were all made to drink  $[\pi o \tau i \zeta \omega, potizo]$  of one Spirit."

verb, first person, plural, aorist, passive, indicative "to drink, give a drink"

Isa. 32:15, "Until the Spirit is poured out upon us from on high, and the wilderness becomes a fertile field, and the fertile field is considered as a forest."

Prov. 1:23, "Turn to my reproof, Behold, I will pour out My Spirit on you; I will make My words known to you."

Joel 2:28, "And it shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out My Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions."

John 7:38, "He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water."

John 7:39, "But this He spoke concerning the Spirit, whom those believing in Him would receive; for the Holy Spirit was not yet *given*, because Jesus was not yet glorified."

Jer. 32:40, "And I will make an everlasting covenant with them, that I will not turn away from doing them good; but I will put My fear in their hearts so that they will not depart from Me."

Acts 1:6–7, "And so when they had come together, they were asking Him, saying, 'Lord, is it at this time You are restoring the kingdom to Israel?' He said to them, 'It is not for you to know times [crovno", chronos] or epochs [kaivro", chairos] which the Father has fixed by His own authority;' "


Times, [χρόνος chronos] emphasizes the events in succession, thus often referring to the "fullness of time," Gal. 4:4. This word often refers to events in fulfillment of prophetic predictions.

Seasons (epochs) [καιρος, chairos] indicates broader expanses of time with certain definable characteristics – comparable to our term ages.

ajiwno", aionos a period of time in human history.

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1 Thess. 5:1, "Now as to the times [crovno", chronos] and the epochs [kaivro", chairos], brethren, you have no need of anything to be written to you."

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
