**THEREFORE, COMFORT ONE

1 Thess. 2:1, “For you yourselves know, brethren, that our coming to you was not in vain.

1 Thess. 2:2, “But even after we had suffered before and were spitefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we were bold in our God to speak to you the gospel of God in much conflict.”

1. First, in 2:1 Paul asserts that they themselves know that their coming, which implies their teaching and exhortation, i.e., 2:3, was not without meaning, purpose, or result. It had borne the fruit of their salvation and spiritual growth.

1 Thess. 2:1, “For you yourselves know, brethren, that our coming to you was not in vain.

empty, foolish, worthless; the opposite is to be full. It can imply something without content or without result or impact.

1 Thess. 2:2, “But even after we had suffered before and were spitefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we were bold in our God to speak to you the gospel of God in much conflict.”

1 Cor. 15:10, “But by the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace toward me was not in vain; but I labored more abundantly than they all, yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me.”

1 Cor. 15:14, “And if Christ is not risen, then our preaching is empty and your faith is also empty.”

1 Cor. 15:58, “Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.”

1 Thess. 2:1, “For you yourselves know, brethren, that our coming to you was not in vain.”

1 Thess. 3:5, “For this reason, when I could no longer endure it, I sent to know your faith, lest by some means the tempter had tempted you, and our labor might be in vain.”

1 Thess. 2:2, “But even after we had suffered before and were spitefully treated at Philippi, as you know, we were bold in our God to speak to you the gospel of God in much conflict.”

2. Second, Paul reminds them that they had endured tremendous rejection, hostility, and suffering as they proclaimed their message, which they would not have done if they had wrong motives.

3. Paul was an example of how to face life's challenges with spiritual courage and boldness. It comes from having the Word of God in your soul. 1 Thess. 2:2

a. Paul's focus was on the gospel and his Christian testimony. It wasn't about self-promotion.

2 Cor. 10:17, "But 'he who glories, let him glory in the LORD.'

2 Cor. 10:18, "For not he who commends himself is approved, but whom the Lord commends."

b. Paul did not take advantage of the miraculous release by leaving, but to be an example of grace toward the jailer.

c. By application we may find ourselves being mistreated, legally, personally, or defamed. If it impacts our witness, if the law or company policy is violated, then we need to act wisely. It isn't about getting even but about justice. So we need to figure out ways to approach the issue.

**d. As a result Paul had the opportunity to lead the Philippian jailer to the Lord.

4. Past failure did not minimize their boldness and courage.

2 Tim. 1:12, “For this reason I also suffer these things; nevertheless I am not ashamed, for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day.”

2 Cor. 4:2, “But we have renounced the hidden things of shame, not walking in craftiness nor handling the word of God deceitfully, but by manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to every man’s conscience in the sight of God.

2 Cor. 4:5, “For we do not preach ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord, and ourselves your bondservants for Jesus’ sake.”

2 Cor. 12:16, “But be that as it may, I did not burden you. Nevertheless, being crafty, I caught you by cunning!”

2 Cor. 12:17, “Did I take advantage of you by any of those whom I sent to you?”

2 Cor. 12:18, “I urged Titus, and sent our brother with him. Did Titus take advantage of you? Did we not walk in the same spirit? Did we not walk in the same steps?”
