

Eph. 1:7, "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness [aphesis] of sins, according to the riches of His grace"

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

Review

1. The emphasis is on our present reality in Christ. In Him, we continue to have redemption.

Redemption happened at the Cross where the price was paid, but is realized in us individually when we believe in Christ. This first aspect is Godward.

- 1 Pet. 1:18, "knowing that you were not redeemed with corruptible things, like silver or gold, from your aimless conduct received by tradition from your fathers,
- 1 Pet. 1:19, "but with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot."

Review

2. Both Hebrew and Greek words emphasize the payment of a price for the purpose of deliverance, release from bondage, or release from a debt.

Eph. 1:7, "In Him we have <u>redemption</u> through His blood, the forgiveness [aphesis] of sins, according to the riches of His grace"

Col. 1:14, "in whom we have <u>redemption</u> through His blood, the forgiveness [aphesis] of sins."

ἀπολύτρωσις (*apolytrōsis*), redemption, to pay a price for something; to purchase something out of the market, to release



3. The implication is a transformed life.

The appositional phrase:


"the forgiveness of sins"

An appositional phrase explains and may slightly expand or emphasize one aspect of the first.

The Words for "Forgive"

ἀφίημι v. (aphiēmi), "let go, cancel, remit, leave, forgive"

ἄφεσις n. (aphesis), "release, pardon, cancellation, forgiveness"

Emphasizes the act of forgiveness.

The Words for "Forgive"

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ἄφεσις n. (*aphēsis*), "release, pardon, cancellation, forgiveness"

χαρίζομαι (charizomai), "gracious forgiveness of a debt, show favor or kindness, to be gracious to someone, to forgive"

Emphasizes the *attitude* underlying forgiveness.

Luke 7:42, "When they were unable to repay, he graciously forgave them both. So which of them will love him more?"

Emphasizes the *attitude* underlying forgiveness.

Col. 2:13, "And you, when you were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, He has made alive together with Him, <u>having</u> forgiven you all trespasses,"

χαρίζομαι *charízomai*; aor act ptcp mns adverbial of cause

- 1. to give freely or graciously
- 2. to cancel a sum of money or debt that is owed, Luke 7:42ff
- 3. to forgive or pardon an action

FOUR Categories of Forgiveness

1. Forgiveness directed toward God, where the justice of God cancels the debt of sin. For all mankind without distinction.

Col. 2:13, "And you, [when you were] dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, He has made alive together with Him, [BECAUSE He cancelled] all [the legal guilt of your] trespasses,

Col. 2:14, "having wiped out the handwriting of requirements that was against us, which was contrary to us. And He has taken it out of the way, having nailed it to the cross."

FOUR Categories of Forgiveness

- 1. Forgiveness directed toward God, where the justice of God cancels the debt of sin. For all mankind without distinction. Forensic Forgiveness
- 2. Forgiveness positionally *in Christ.* Forgiveness personally realized at the moment of salvation. Eph. 1:7; Col. 2:14
- 3. Experiential forgiveness. 1 John 1:9
- 4. Relational forgiveness. Eph. 4:32

1 John 1:7, "But if we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin."

1 John 1:8, "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us."

1 John 1:9, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Eph. 4:32, "And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you.

Eph. 5:1, "Therefore be imitators of God as dear children."
