




παρακαλέω *parakaleō* 1 sing pres act indic to urge, exhort, comfort

κλησις klēsis with the article fem sing gen "the calling"





<u>Eph. 4:2</u>, "with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love," ~NKJV



Eph. 4:2, "with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, <u>bearing with one another</u> in love," ~NKJV

ἀγάπη agapē fem sing dat love; a broad word for love, in contrast to philos, which emphasizes a more intimate friendship love. "putting up with one another by means of love"

<u>Gal. 5:22,</u> "But the fruit of the Spirit is <u>love</u>, joy, peace, <u>longsuffering</u>, kindness, goodness, faithfulness,

<u>Gal. 5:23, "gentleness, self-control. Against</u> such there is no law."

μακροθυμία *makrothumia* fem sing nom patience, endurance, restraint of anger, often used as a synonym of "*anexomai*" *bearing with.* πραΰς (praÿs),
gentle, humble,
considerate, meek;
πραΰτης (praÿtēs),
gentleness,
humility, strength
under control

John 13:34, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another.

John 13:35, "By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." <u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal."

The Oracle of Delphi

"And for Incoherent Speech, it was amongst the Gentiles taken for one sort of **Prophecy, because the Prophets of their** Oracles, intoxicated with a spirit, or vapor from the cave of the Pythian Oracle at Delphi, were for a time really mad, and spake like mad-men; of whose loose words a sense might be made to fit any event, in such sort, as all bodies are said to be made of Materia prima." ~Thomas Hobbes

<u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though [If] <u>I speak</u> with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal."

λαλέω *laleo*, first person, singular, present, active, subjunctive to speak, to talk <u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though I speak with the <u>tongues</u> of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal."

Glossa, languages

<u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I <u>have become</u> sounding brass or a clanging cymbal."

γίνομαι ginomai verb, first person, singular, perfect, active, indicative; since the whole sentence is the apodosis of a third class condition "IF I WERE TO SPEAK WITH TONGUES OF MEN AND OF ANGELS I WOULD HAVE BECOME" <u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become <u>sounding brass</u> or a clanging cymbal."

χαλκὸς ἦχῶν *chalkos echon*, materials of bronze were acoustic resonators hence, *echon* "sounding" indicates something that produces sound. The pres ptcp indicates continuous action. Cymbals and other percussion instruments were used to get the attention of the gods in the mystery religions. <u>1 Cor. 13:1</u>, "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a <u>clanging cymbal</u>."

κύμβαλον ἀλαλάζον *Kumbalon alalazon*, a musical instrument, some kind of cymbal. *Alalazon*, wailing loudly, a reverberating noise. <u>1 Cor. 13:2</u>, "And though I have *the gift of* prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing." <u>1 Cor. 13:3</u>, "And though I bestow all my goods to feed *the poor,* and though I give my body to be burned, but have not love, it profits me nothing." <u>1 Cor. 13:3</u>, "And though I <u>bestow</u> all my goods to feed *the poor,* and though <u>I give</u> my body to be burned, but have not love, it profits me nothing."

παραδίδωμι, *paradidomi* verb, first person, singular, aorist, active, subjunctive, "to give up, hand over, deliver up." <u>1 Cor. 13:3</u>, "And though I bestow all my goods to feed *the poor*, and though I give my body to be burned, but have not love, it <u>profits</u> me nothing."

ώφελέω, opheleo verb, first person, singular, present, passive, indicative, "to profit, to be useful, beneficial, of value"

Καυχήσωμαι I might boast καυθησωμαι I might be burned

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u>, "Love <u>suffers long</u> *and* is <u>kind</u>; love does not envy; love does not parade itself, is not puffed up;"

μακροθυμέω *makrothuméō*; long suffering, patience, steadfastness; to remain tranguil and calm while waiting, to endure provocation without complaint

χρηστεύομαι chrēsteúomai, to show oneself mild, to be kind chrystos, a cognate noun, means something easy, or to be morally good and benevolent. Emphasizes a positive reaching out or being useful or helpful to someone else.

<u>1 Cor. 13:4</u>, "Love suffers long *and* is kind; love does not <u>envy</u>; love does <u>not parade</u> <u>itself</u>, is not <u>puffed up</u>;"

ζηλόω *zēlóō* plus the negative, to be jealous or envious; an uncontrolled outburst

φυσιόω *phusióō* to be puffed up or conceited, related to the conceit or *gnosis* in 1 Cor. 8:1 περπερεύομαι perpereúomai; does not brag, or speak emptily of its own accomplishments. Which is related to the next word ... <u>1 Cor. 13:5</u>, "does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil;"

<u>1 Cor. 13:6</u>, "does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth;"

<u>1 Cor. 13:7</u>, "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."
