





"Eglon" a paronomasia on 'egel, "bull, calf," or a "fat calf" — a diminutive form, but it is also based on the same consonants as agol, for "round, rotund"





The phrase "a left handed man" is *itter, yad* yemino

Literally, "shut up to the right hand"






Plan of Eglon's palace at Jericho, based on the "Middle Building" found by Garstang






