

What Work Does God
Begin and Complete?
Philippians 1:5–6



Php. 1:5, "for your fellowship in the gospel from the first day until now,

Php. 1:6, "being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ;" ~NKJV

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Two questions we need to answer:

1. For what is Paul thankful?

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Two questions we need to answer:

- 1. For what is Paul thankful?
- 2. For what is he confident?

Two Interpretations:

1. By far the most popular way to understand this verse is that it relates to salvation. The "good work" mentioned either refers to Phase 1 Justification or Phase 2 Sanctification.

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Two forms:

- a. God graciously works in the believer's life to enable them to grow, if they are willing.
- b. A genuine believer in Jesus Christ who is truly regenerate, will persevere in faith and good works, until God glorifies them following their death or the Rapture.

Three Problems with This View:

1. Salvation, either as Phase 1 Justification or Phase 2 Sanctification, is not mentioned in this opening introduction or prayer. Neither are in the context.

Three Problems with This View:

2. Second, it must be observed that Paul writes of a singular "good work," not of plural "good works." Further, Paul states he is confident of this thing, a singular noun, most English translations supply the singular "it" referring to this good work, to be more understandable.

Eph. 2:8, "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that by grace through faith salvation is not of yourselves; it is the gift of God,

Eph. 2:9, "not of works, lest anyone should boast.

Eph. 2:10, "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them." ~NKJV

Three Problems with This View:

3. The context is Paul's gratitude for their partnership in the gospel, specifically their financial partnership with his ministry, which is not the same as either Phase 1 Justification or Phase 2 Sanctification.

In a BibSac article (1984):

The ergon agathon ("good work") in verse 6 must be interpreted by the koinonia of the previous verse. This exegetical point is frequently noted by commentators, though few of them consistently restrict it enough to this sense. This writer holds that verse 6 refers restrictively [italics original] to the perfecting of the Philippians as workers for the gospel, and to the perfecting of their works in the cause of the gospel. Many exegetes, failing to note this, have thus failed to see that verses 3–6 contain a thematic summary of the entire epistle [italics added] ... Verses 3–6 then, are a cameo of the entire epistle. They introduce the main theme, the Philippians' partnership in the gospel.

Furthermore, another author writes perceptively:

... we seem to have evidence of an inclusio which binds the whole letter into one unit. First of all, the idea of partnership is strongly expressed at the beginning and the end. Thus in [Php.] 1:5 Paul is "thankful for your partnership (κοινωνία) in the gospel"; and in [Php.] 4:15 he records that "no church entered into partnership in giving and receiving except you only."

Furthermore, another author writes perceptively:

This partnership is reiterated in another parallel: in [Php.] 1:7 the Philippians are sharers (συγκοινωνούς) of grace with Paul; in [Php.] 4:15 they are sharers (συγκοινωνήσαντες) with him in his trouble. At both beginning and end we have the same idea expressed in different ways: the longstanding partnership of the Philippians with Paul: "from the first day until now" ([Php.] 1:5), and "in the beginning of the gospel" ([Php.] 4:15). And finally the reciprocal attitude of sympathy between Paul and the Philippians is expressed in the same phrase: in [Php.] 1:7 he says "it is right for me to feel this about you" (τοῦτο φρονεῖν ὑπὲρ πάντων ὑμῶν), and in [Php.] 4:10, "You have revived your concern for me" (τὸ ὑπὲρ ἐμοῖ φρονείν).

<u>James 2:8</u>, "If you really fulfill the royal law according to the Scripture, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself,' <u>you do well</u>;

<u>James 2:19</u>, "You believe that there is one God. You <u>do</u> <u>well</u>. Even the demons believe—and tremble!"

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Php. 4:17, "Not that I seek the gift, but I seek the fruit that abounds to your account."

Php. 4:8, "Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things."

κοινωνία *koinōnia* fem sing dat fellowship, participation; society; partnership

Rom. 15:26, "For it pleased those from Macedonia and Achaia to make a certain <u>contribution</u> for the poor among the saints who are in Jerusalem." ~NKJV

Partnership with God:

2 Cor. 6:14, "Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what partnership has light with darkness?" ~NKJV

Partnership with God:

2 Cor. 8:4, "imploring us with much urgency that we would receive the gift and the fellowship of the ministering to the saints." ~NKJV

Partnership with God:

2 Cor. 9:13, "while, through the proof of this ministry, they glorify God for the obedience of your confession to the gospel of Christ, and for your generous partnership with them and all men," ~RD
